

We prepare for our time together.

We take our places and allow the peaceful quiet to center and calm us.

The bold portions

are the parts the congregation says together. Remember that "liturgy" means worshipping together. It is important that we make our responses in a good, strong voice.

The first prayer, said by the celebrant, is the **Collect for Purity**. A collect is a particular form of prayer, which names some attribute of God or something God has done, asks for something specific and then closes with praise to God.

The Lessons The First Lesson: Jeremiah 31:7-97

Psalm 126

Lector We will read the Psalm in unison.

- 1 When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, * then were we like those who dream.
- 2 Then was our mouth filled with laughter, * "The Lord has done great things for them."
- 4 The Lord has done great things for us, * and we are glad indeed.
- 5 Restore our fortunes, O Lord, * like the watercourses of the Negev.

We respond to each reading: the **Psalm** is our response to the Old Testament, in the second service, the hymn is our sung response to the **Epistle** (the second reading), and the sermon and creed are our response to the **Gospel**. Meaning literally "a letter," the name **Epistle** was given to the first of the two New Testament readings in the eucharist. The majority of these passages are taken from the epistolary l iterature of the New Testament, such as the letters of Paul to communities of Christians in various places.

We stand to indicate the importance we place of Jesus' words and actions. The **Gospel** book comes into the midst of the people and all turn toward the reader.

- 6 Those who sowed with tears * will reap with songs of joy.
- 7 Those who go out weeping, carrying the seed, * will come again with joy, shouldering their sheaves.

The Epistle: Hebrews 7:23-28

Lector A reading from Paul's Letter to the Hebrews

The former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but Jesus holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues forever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

For it was fitting that we should have such a high priest, holy, blameless, undefiled, separated from sinners, and exalted above the heavens. Unlike the other high priests, he has no need to offer sacrifices day after day, first for his own sins, and then for those of the people; this he did once for all when he offered himself. For the law appoints as high priests those who are subject to weakness, but the word of the oath, which came later than the law, appoints a Son who has been made perfect forever.

The Gospel Lesson: Mark 10:46-52

Jesus and his disciples came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

BCP 358

A **Sermon** or a shorter teaching called a homily follows the Gospel. Since 1549, a sermon has been required at every Eucharist service.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate: he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures;

We use the **Nicene Creed** on Sundays, and the Apostle's Creed for Baptism. Both are ancient statements of faith.

Why do some people bow their head for part of the creed? Some bow at "he came down from heaven" as a sign of reverent respect for Jesus' incarnate presence with us.

Our prayers change each week, along with the lectionary. Please feel free to add those on your heart, either silently or aloud, at the appropriate place. he ascended into heaven



All are welcome to join a special All Saints Evensong at St. John's Cathedral on Sunday, November 3rd at 4:45 pm. We are pleased to welcome Dr. Scott Roberts, Organ Scholar, from Good Shepherd Episcopal Church as our Organ Prelude guest recitalist. A brief reception will follow the service.



Despite the vow of "Never Again," many Jewish individuals in Tennessee today feel unsafe openly practicing their faith. As noted by Holocaust survivor Marty Weiss, the situation echoes the prelude to World War II.

To address rising antisemitism and promote Holocaust education, we're introducing a new program for Clergy and Congregational Staff titled: "God and the Holocaust: Investigating Faith, Uniting Against Contemporary Antisemitism" This series features webinars throughout November, led by renowned scholars and theologians in Holocaust and interfaith studies:

- Thursday, November 7- Father John Pawlikowski, OSM—founding member of Chicago's Catholic Theological Union, and appointed by President Jimmy Carter to serve on the United States Holocaust Memorial Council (reappointed by Presidents George H.W. Bush, and Bill Clinton)
- **Tuesday, November 12** Dr. Victoria Barnett—eminent scholar of Dietrich Bonhoeffer and the Confessing Church, and former USHMM Director of Programs on Ethics and Religion
- **Tuesday, November 19** Rabbi Mark Schiftan—Chair of the Tennessee Holocaust Commission, the son of Holocaust Survivors, a Top 25 Pulpit Rabbi as ranked by Newsweek and Jewish Faith Student Advisor at Belmont University



In this season, will use **Eucharistic Prayer A**, from the Book of Common Prayer, p. 361.

Prayer A is a modern adaptation of prayers of previous American Books of Common Prayer.

From the Latin for "holy," the **Sanctus** is a hymn of adoration and praise based on the song of the seraphim as recorded in Isaiah's vision of the Lord in the year King Uzziah died.

The people stand or kneel. Then the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

The people stand or kneel, and the celebrant continues

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and

When we gather together we remember Jesus. Through repeating the words and actions of Jesus' last meal with his disciples, we ourselves join the story and make it our own. We don't just watch the drama or listen to it unfold, but we enter into the story as we too take the bread and wine and eat and drink.

"The mystery of faith"

echoes 1 Timothy 3:9, and has been used in Eucharistic Prayers since the 7th century. serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

Celebrant and People

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen. The Great Amen is the only word in our Book of Common Prayer in all capital letters. It is the people's affirmation of all that has gone before, and has been a practice since the 2nd century. In this service, we sing our Amens.

This prayer of Jesus was given to his disciples as an example of how they should pray. It is similar to Jewish prayers: it begins with an address to God the Father, continues with petitions which ask God to act in a way which would achieve his purposes, and then has petitions which ask for God's help.





Healing of Blind Man of Jericho (Central panel of triptych) 1531 Lucas van Leyden (Flemish, 1494-1533) Oil on canvas The State Hermitage Museum, St. Petersburg, Russia


The Hermitage triptych belongs to the best and typical works by Lucas van Leyden. In taking as his subject one of the miracles performed by Christ, as related in the Gospel According to Luke (18: 35-43), the artist treated the biblical subject like an entertaining genre scene. The central characters are Christ and the blind man, who is led by a boy, yet they are shown not prominent in the foreground, but a little deeper in the painting, surrounded by a colourful crowd of people. Amongst those looking on as the miracle takes place are the apostles, as well as various citizens, soldiers, monks, women with children and even a cripple who points at Christ, confirming the fact of the cure of the blind. All are dressed in 16th-century attire and their faces are free of idealization. Lucas van Leyden was seeking to convey above all the crowd's emotional reaction.
