

The Lessons

Lector A reading from the Book of Isaiah.

The Second Lesson: Acts 10: 34-43

Lector A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to them: “I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all.

That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.”

Art Reflection

Bartolomé Esteban Murillo, *The Baptism of Christ* (c.1655) in the Gemäldegalerie Museum, Berlin, Germany.

The boy Jesus has now grown up. But in a sense what we're seeing in this scene is another epiphany, that's to say another moment of revelation. In this case it's the revelation that happens when Jesus comes to be baptized. This is fascinating because here we have John the Baptist being almost the dominant figure in **Bartolomé Esteban Murillo, *The Baptism of Christ* (c.1655) in the Gemäldegalerie** this canvas, which was painted by an artist called Bartolome Murillo from Seville in Spain. This is part of a sequence of four canvases on the life of John the Baptist he painted, so it makes sense that in this moment he's representing John as the dominant figure.

John is described in the Bible as establishing a ministry on the banks of the River Jordan outside Jerusalem and preaching about one who was going to come after him who would judge the people, and asking them to prepare themselves for this moment by a change of life by repenting by living more honestly and righteously. To symbolize that newness of life he called them to a form of ritual washing in the river an immersion actually which is what baptism means.

We're told that huge crowds came from Jerusalem and all over Judea both to hear him and to undergo this ritual. Jesus appears then amongst the crowds and asks John if he too can be baptized. John agrees somewhat reluctantly to do this because he recognizes that this is the man that he's been talking about and preparing people for. He nevertheless does it and at that moment something additional and very remarkable happens which is that the heavens open and a voice from heaven, from God the Father, is heard declaring that Jesus is his Beloved Son. What this artist has done is actually inscribe those words of God the Father on the top of the painting. Here you can see the the words are just truncated and that's because this painting has been cut down but rather wonderfully emphasizing the importance of that moment of acknowledgement of Jesus as his Son: "This is my Beloved Son with whom I am well pleased." It's the full sentence. You see here also this the dove reappears as a sign of the Holy Spirit.

The other way this artist has captured a particular relationship between these two figures is to show the figure of Jesus kneeling, and that seems like a gesture of humility. He's asking to be baptized by John. But as we know from the Bible stories, this is a crucial moment in which John says he who comes after me will be greater than me. So in this moment, Murillo has represented John the Baptist as the greater and the more dominant but if we know our Gospel stories we know that there's going to be a shift and that John the Baptist will recede in importance and Jesus will rise up and begin his own preaching and ministry.

Even these crossed arms seem to be a very humble kind of just a receiving gesture. But there is another text in this painting, along with the words of God the Father, and that's the text on the band roll which is attached to John's reed cross, one of the things he's frequently shown carrying with him, that shows words that he's recorded as speaking in the Gospel of John where he says of Jesus, "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world." So that word behold in Latin is itself a sort of pointing away word. So John is already beginning to direct our attention away from himself, even though he's so dominant here in this painting, and towards Jesus. Both earth and heaven have joined together in witnessing publicly to who this man is and this is such a fascinating moment because it's going to be a shift in power and Jesus' role is going to become far more public; he's going to be preaching and teaching and performing a whole series of miracles.

Ben Quash and Jennifer Sliwka. 'Jesus Christ, the Baptism,' a short film in the series *Unlocking Christian Art*.

Produced in partnership with the National Museums in Berlin, these short films tell the story of Jesus with the help of the treasures of the Bode-Museum and the Gemäldegalerie, both sculpture and painting.
